In ilwaukee's Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs, also known as Community Health Centers) provide a comprehensive range of primary care, dental and behavioral health services to medically underserved populations in our community. This includes care management, health promotion and supportive services such as transportation, interpretation and financial counseling. They provide culturally competent health services in the communities where their patients live. Community health centers serve as economic engines in their neighborhoods — providing a source of employment, neighborhood development and revitalization.


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




In 2011, Milwaukee's FQHC's provided primary care to over 77,000 total patients and over 600,000 primary care encounters. About 40% of health center patients are children.

Milwaukee's Community Health Centers:

- Serve as 'health care homes.' They provide comprehensive primary healthcare and link patients to specialty care and support services. Each provides 24-hour emergency telephone access and some maintain evening and/or weekend hours.
- Emphasize disease prevention and overall wellness. While treating chronic health conditions is a key component of the heath centers, they also emphasize the importance of annual screenings, proper nutrition, physical activity and general social stability (i.e. employment, housing, behavioral health, etc.).
- Rely on public and private funding to support their mission. The health centers receive favorable, cost-based reimbursement from the state Medicaid program and limited federal grant support to help offset some of the cost of care for uninsured patients. Each requires some payment for care from all patients, according to their income and ability to pay.
- Maximize community input and involvement. They are non-profit corporations created through the initiative of local citizens interested in bringing health care to their neighborhoods. FQHCs are governed by at least a 51% consumer-majority board of directors, giving the patients of each health center the ability to influence decisions.
- Drive economic and workforce development in their communities. Milwaukee's health centers currently employ approximately 90 physicians, advanced practice nurses and dentists, and almost 500 staff. The Milwaukee FQHC's contribute over \$68 million dollars annually to the overall economic wellbeing of the community.
