Uncompensated Care

These figures reflect the actual cost of care provided in inpatient, outpatient and emergency room settings to uninsured and low-income patients in Milwaukee County. Medicaid shortfalls represent the difference in the cost of care and government reimbursement.

Community Health Improvement

Beyond providing direct and subsidized medical care for vulnerable populations, Milwaukee's health systems contribute to an array of health improvement activities such as financial support to federally qualified health centers, safety net clinics, and school-based health and dental services. The health systems also provide health education and outreach, wellness programs, preventative screenings and support groups. Health improvement initiatives also include donations to community-based organizations to address the social and economic determinants of health, as well as health professions education, and health care workforce development programs.

This report follows the CHA Community Benefit Guidelines, which exclude Medicare shortfalls and bad debt expense. In 2013, hospitals in Milwaukee County reported additional uncompensated care of nearly \$130 million in Medicare shortfalls and over \$88 million in bad debt expense. All uncompensated care reflects the actual cost of care, not hospital charges.
