Mission

Established in 2007, the Milwaukee Health Care Partnership (MHCP) is a public/private consortium dedicated to improving health care for low-income, underserved populations in Milwaukee County with the aim of improving health outcomes, advancing health equity and lowering the total cost of care.

Goals:

- Secure and retain adequate and affordable health insurance for all
- Increase the availability, accessibility and acceptability of health care services
- Enhance care coordination/navigation within and across the delivery system
- Identify and address targeted community health needs

Who We Serve: Milwaukee's Vulnerable Populations

The MHCP's primary focus is improving care for low-income, medically underserved Milwaukee County residents who are uninsured or covered by public insurance programs.

FY22-23 PLAN PRIORITIES

Coverage

- Increase and maintain enrollment in Medicaid, Marketplace and other insurance options and improve health insurance literacy
- Support implementation of Medicaid eligibility and enrollment reforms
- Inform Medicaid policy, program and payment reforms

Access

- Support implementation of the FQHC capacity building plan including HIT, workforce development and shared program/service expansion
- Continuously improve the Specialty Access for Uninsured Program
- Improve access and navigation to behavioral health services for adults and vouth
- Support implementation of the psychiatric crisis services redesign, including the Mental Health Emergency Center

Care Coordination

- Continuously improve programs to connect patients to primary care to improve health outcomes and reduce avoidable ED and IP utilization
- Continuously improve and expand housing navigation via the Housing is Health Program
- Enhance social needs screening and navigation processes and tools to address other determinants of health
- Optimize HIT and HIE capabilities to improve access, create efficiencies and enhance care coordination

Community Health

- Facilitate cross-organizational and inter-sector health improvement planning informed by the shared Community Health Needs Assessment
- Promote and continuously improve the utilization and value of Health Compass Milwaukee
- Continuously improve the Shared Community Investment Fund and the Health Improvement Fund alignment and impact
- Implement and measure the impact of health care sector violence prevention and intervention initiatives

COMMUNITY IMPACT EXAMPLES

Access to Primary Care

Since 2009, the
Emergency Department to
Medical Home Program
has scheduled more than
60,000 appointments at
primary care clinics for
pregnant women, people
with chronic conditions,
and frequent ER users.

Access to Specialty Care

Through the Specialty Access for Uninsured Program (SAUP), over 21,000 uninsured patients have received critical specialty care at Milwaukee health systems since 2012. Access to Mental Health Care

In 2022, doors opened to the Mental Health Emergency Center—a joint venture between Milwaukee County and the four Milwaukee health systems.

Addressing Determinants of Health

In the first three years of the Housing is Health Program, 242 patients from ER and primary care settings have secured temporary housing and 120 have secured permanent housing.

Other Community Investments

Since 2017, more than \$35,000,000 in contributions from the four Milwaukee health systems to the Shared Community Investment Fund (SCIF) has been reinvested into the community to support aligned goals.
