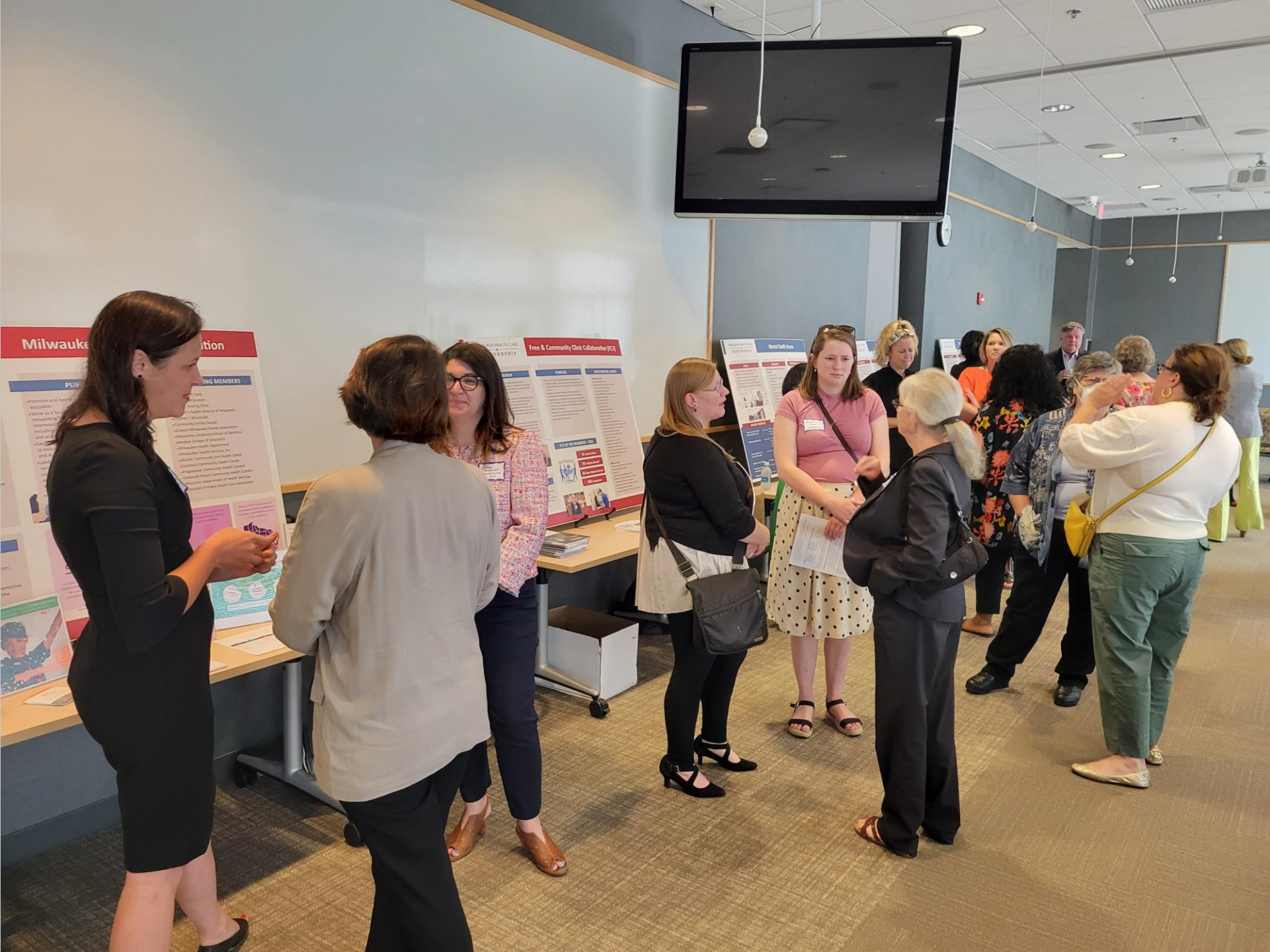

OVERVIEW

Community Health Centers, known as Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs), are integral to the fabric of Milwaukee's health care delivery system. FQHCs:
• Provide comprehensive and culturally-appropriate primary care, oral, mental health, and substance use disorder services regardless of patients' ability to pay or health insurance status
• Offer a sliding fee scale to persons with incomes below 200% FPL
• Are governed by community majority Boards
• Focus on serving low-income and marginalized communities

Public Capacity Building work to strengthen the five FQHCs in Milwaukee by identifying areas for improvement, program effectiveness, program enhancements, opportunities for services, and collaboration with organizations across the health sector.

Specialty Access for the Uninsured

OVERVIEW

In 2013, the Milwaukee Health Care Partnership launched the Specialty Access for the Uninsured (SAUP) to replace the fragmented delivery system with a new model of care. The SAUP model established partnerships between health systems, with participating systems to coordinate care. In the SAUP model, participating health systems each secure a primary care and outpatient specialty care (cardiology, pulmonology, etc.)

GOALS

- Increase specialty care delivery
- Improve efficiency and effectiveness of primary care and specialty care
- Improve health outcomes
- Decrease total cost of care

TARGET POPULATION

- Milwaukee County
- Uninsured population
- At or below the poverty level
- Unable to pay for care

Milwaukee Oral Health Partnership

OVERVIEW

Oral health is essential to an individual's overall health and well-being, and a growing body of research demonstrates this connection. Oral health issues more than healthy teeth; it contributes to controlling and avoiding chronic disease and pain, as well as disease prevention and self-esteem.

Although much is known about the importance of oral health and the power of prevention, there remains significant disparities in dental access across the state of Wisconsin and locally in Milwaukee. Certain segments of the population, including young, racialized groups who also face barriers to accessing oral services. These individuals may be underserved, at lower socioeconomic status, have limited financial, and environmental factors that impact health.

PURPOSE

- Promote oral health awareness, prevention, and education
- Serve as a forum for information exchange and networking for MCHC members and other interested community partners on oral health, including access to care, advocacy, data collection and analysis, and structure review to drive change
- Develop cohesion across membership organizations and duplication of efforts and resources
- Lead and/or participate in advocacy efforts that secure adequate and affordable oral health coverage for the population and thus increase access, especially for those utilizing Medicaid or who are uninsured

CURRENT STRATEGIES

Uniform care and local health policy initiatives and health care regulation, construction, and coordination dental access delivery, initiated in 2022

Oral health care to organ, routine, and preventative services

Oral health care to those on Medicaid and the uninsured

Shared Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA)

HEALTH EQUITY

CHNA is grounded in a broad and comprehensive understanding of population health – taking into account the social, behavioral, and environmental factors that health care accounts for roughly 20% of outcomes to overall health. In reviewing and analyzing health outcome and health factor data around the county, a racial and health equity lens was utilized to bring attention to health disparities and their root causes.
